The Authors' Deposit Service

The German Games Archive was founded in 1985 as a historiographical archive, and has taken on the task of documenting games production since 1945 as a foundation for in-depth analysis and thoughtful research, and to promote the development of games in our time. As a special service, the German Games Archive in Nuremberg offers game authors a way to archive their concepts in the form of physical copies.

An author who has developed a game can file the associated documents with the Archive, as safeguarded evidence, for three years. The games are submitted under sealed cover, guaranteeing that only the author knows the contents. Only the author can decide who gets to see the game, and when. The deposit will be kept in the Archive for three years, after which it will be returned to the author via registered mail. The author is charged a one-time fee of €75 for the service (for games from outside Germany, €100). This amount includes all administrative expenses and the cost of return shipment.

To make sure the deposit is stored properly, it goes without saying that the sender must carefully follow the instructions on the attached form letter most notably, be sure to carry out each step in the right order.

If you want to file a game with the German Games Archive, send the attached form letter with a check for €75 (submissions from outside Germany, €100) to the Archive, and wait for our reply letter. Once you receive our reply, you can then send in your deposit to the Archive as a sealed package, by registered mail with return receipt.

You can find out more about how to handle concepts for games in the paperback "Guidelines for Game Inventors," available for only €10 (cash in advance) from the German Games Archive in Nuremberg. (Only in German at present; not available in bookstores.) The guidelines also include information about standard contracts, how to approach publishers, how to design rules, and more.
